- Built a 50-state inventory of workforce-aligned scholarship programs by reviewing state policy documents and compiling program rules (eligibility, covered credentials, funding, or review system)
- Cleaned and merged Kentucky administrative data, integrating degree, enrollment, master person identifiers, financial aid, readiness, and course enrollment with UI wage records in Stata to analyze the effect of enrolling in Work Ready Kentucky Scholarship programs.
- Wrote Stata code for a Difference-in-Differences design using 7.5 million observations.
- Wrote and published three policy briefs.

Heterogeneous Returns to Sub-Baccalaureate Credentials: Machine Learning Approach

- Constructed a student-level analysis dataset linking sub-baccalaureate credential completion to UI wage records for 160,000 observations.
- Estimated average and heterogeneous treatment effects (ATE, GATE, IATE) using Double Machine Learning and Causal Forests in Python; analyzed heterogeneity by gender, race, major, prior income, and credit accumulation.
- Estimated DiD with PSM weights to compare the performance with Machine Learning estimates.
- Produced visualizations of each subgroup and distributional patterns.

Welfare Effects of State Postsecondary Scholarships: MCT Approach

- Applied the Marginal Corrective Transfer (MCT) framework of Agrawal, Hoyt, and Ly (2025) to evaluate interjurisdictional fiscal externalities from Florida's need-based Student Assistance Grant.
- Estimated local and social Marginal Values of Public Funds (MVPFs) by combining causal program estimates with state administrative scholarship data, ACS housing data, property-tax millage rates, and Zillow rent data.
- Quantified welfare components including student willingness to pay, housing-market effects, property-tax revenues, fiscal externalities, and migration-related spillovers across jurisdictions.
- Developed a framework for comparing need-based and merit-based state financial aid programs and assessing when intergovernmental transfers may improve social welfare.

Office of Student Research Program

- Developed and estimated a Structural VAR model to study fiscal policy effects using the Hicksian supermultiplier framework; compiled quarterly macroeconomic series from FRED and the Bureau of Economic Analysis.
- Conducted lag selection, Granger causality tests, variance decomposition, and impulse response analysis; simulated GDP paths under alternative government spending scenarios.
